

#### MERRY-GO-ROUNDS



In 2019 we were able to install 7 new Merry-Go-Round systems. Adokope, Mansokwa, Zippo Nyuinyui, Wenamda, Galelia, Akwanso and Obosono. It is with heartfelt gratitude that we thank our donors who have made this possible to give the gift of light and power to over 1,000 more school-aged children this year. This will make a significant impact on them as well as their families. As Empower Playgrounds seeks to improve the reading levels and skills of these children we know their lives will be greatly impacted.

This year was our first year working with a Ghanaian corporate sponsor. Empower Playgrounds teamed up with Accra Brewing Company to install a Merry-Go-Round project in Obosono. We are grateful for the support from this local business and look forward to working with them again.



#### SCIENCE KITS







Continuing to do research on the progress and the effectiveness of the Science Kit project. We found that students who have used our science kits are more interested in careers in STEM than those who have not. We also found that many teachers were not aware of our science kits. They had either been out sick during the initial training or they had moved to the school after the training. EPI has implemented ongoing teacher training for the science kits to ensure that each teacher knows the resources at their disposal. EPI has also begun hanging science kit posters highlighting the EPI Science Kits available at each school to help teachers know what lessons they can use each kit for.

This last year Richard has been able to help implement science clubs at several of our schools. The Government has allowed for an additional hour after school to support programs like this. These science clubs help to continue to educate our students in STEM activities.

#### LIBRARIES






This last year we were able to add 5 new libraries to our schools. In 2019 Adenya, Manponshai, Nyienpeya, Kurosua and Nwowosua all received new libraries in partnership with the African Library project. According to many studies conducted by UNESCO, literacy is key to reaching a higher standard of living. In countries like Ghana, where up to 70% of rural inhabitants are illiterate, there is a shortage of educational funding and most resources go towards teachers and classrooms. There is simply no place in the budget for supplementary reading materials, let alone a library.

Our partnership with the African Library Project and through generous donations from our donors has enabled us to bring libraries to our schools in Ghana at an affordable rate.

#### **COMPUTER LABS**





Our computer lab at Attabui Primary and Junior high School has continued to be a successful one as students have learned from the Information and Communications Technology (ICT) Teachers. This year we have been fortunate to add computers in the following schools: Wurudu Wurudu, Nyienpeya, Adorkope and Bahankra. Each one of these schools received one laptop. We believe that even with one computer these schools will benefit by learning more about the technology and how to use it.

#### **CLASSROOM BLOCKS**





In 2019 EPI completed two major construction projects. Both schools were in desperate need of new classrooms to support their growing student population. Like most of the communities that we build, Community 9 and Watro had previously built schools with whatever materials they could find. In a country like Ghana where there are multiple rainy seasons this is a serious problem and impediment to students' learning. Empower Playgrounds partnered with the Roberts Family Foundation for our Community 9 and Watro projects.





#### FEMININE HYGIENE KITS






In 2019 Empower Playgrounds was able to donate 834 Days for Girls (a global organization) Kits to 12 more schools this year. Each kit contains reusable pads, soap, wash clothes, panties, absorbent liners, a drawstring bag or zippered pouch, and plastic zip bags for washing used pads. Peace Yeri is our menstruation kit project manager. She conducts the training at the schools and meets with the headmasters and PTA leaders to discuss the project. Whenever EPI introduces a new project to a school we try to inform and involve community members as well as school leaders to ensure the project's adoption and ultimate success. It is because of this program that girls in rural villages in Ghana are now able to stay in school everyday. They no longer are falling behind their male counterparts due to their menstrual cycles.



## BOREHOLE PROJECTS





There are so many rural communities in Ghana that do not have access to clean water. In many cases children have to walk 3 miles or more to fetch water. Oftentimes, their water sources are not clean and lead to many serious health problems. In 2019, EPI with the generous donation from the Roberts Family Foundation was able to put in a borehole water project at one of our schools, Fawotrikosie. The children and families from this remote village area have been able to be blessed with access to clean water.

#### GIRLS SCHOLARSHIPS

2019 was a major year for Empower Playgrounds and our Girl's Scholarship Students. All 3 of the girls: Martha, Gladys and Jennifer graduated from High School. Jennifer is waiting to hear on admission to Teacher Training College. Martha and Gladys are using their year of service to figure out what direction they would like to continue on. We know this will make a major impact on each one of their lives. As each girl decides what is next for their future we know it will be brighter due to the education that they have received. Together with the Roberts Family Foundation we have been able to change their trajectory.

2020 will be a re-evaluation year for this part of Empower Playgrounds as we search for others who could be future recipients. The Ghanaian government has now made High School free. This has reduced our need to fund scholarships. However, we are still looking for ways that we can continue to encourage girls to see the importance of going to high school and recieving those higher educational opportunities.

We are sad to announce the postponement of our 2020 Fall Event, but will be in touch as we reschedule our event for early 2021.


